Wireless and ethernet access to the internet is available to members of the media in the Burke-Tarr Stadium Press Box. Please see a member of the Carson-Newman Media Relations Staff for access prior to each game.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Requests for press box or sideline passes should be submitted in advance of game dates to the Carson-Newman Media Relations Office. Press box space is limited, so priority will be given to media outlets which regularly cover the Eagles. Remaining seats will be assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis. Every attempt will be made to provide indoor seating for scouts, but the working press will be given first consideration. Sideline passes for photographers will be granted upon request. If time permits, credentials will be mailed; Otherwise, the passes will be left at the will call window of the C-N ticket booth. **PRESS BOX**

The main press box at Burke-Tarr Stadium is located atop the west stands and provides unobstructed, enclosed viewing of the game for media personnel, both coaching staffs and visitors to the C-N President's Box. The entrance, which is available to only those with proper credentials, and is accessed by the elevator. Restrooms are located in the main press box and beneath the west stands. **STADIUM PRESS BOX TOBACCO POLICY**

In accordance with the policies and procedures of Carson-Newman College and

the laws of the state of Tennessee, all areas of Burke-Tarr Stadium are a smoke-free environment. This does include the stadium press box. This rule includes all forms of tobacco products. The C-N Media Relations Office appreciates the media's cooperation in adherence to this policy.

MEDIA SERVICES

Interviews with Carson-Newman Head Coach Ken Sparks, players, or other athletic personnel must be arranged through the Carson-Newman Media Relations Office. Please contact the Sports Information Director to set up a meeting date, time and location. Best times for interviews during the week are before and after practice. Media outlets will not be granted interviews prior to or during a game, but arrangements for postgame meetings can be made.

Telephone interviews are available to the media on a "call-back" basis only. Individual player telephone numbers WILL NOT be given to members of the media under any circumstances. Dr. J. Randall O'Brien 22nd President Carson-Newman College

Dr. J. Randall O'Brien was named the 22nd president of Carson-Newman College on July 8. Previously the provost, professor of religion and visiting law professor at Baylor University, the McComb, Mississippi native is a graduate of Yale Divinity School, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and Mississippi College.

O'Brien went to Baylor in 1991 as an associate professor of religion after serving for three years as senior pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in Little Rock, Ark. During his service at Baylor, he served as interim provost and vice president for academic affairs, professor and chair of the department of religion, acting dean of the George W. Truett Theological Seminary and executive assistant to the president of the university before his position as executive vice president and provost. From 1980-1987 he held a tenured faculty appointment at Ouachita Baptist University.

As a Baylor professor, O'Brien received numerous teaching awards selected by students, including Mortar Board's Circle of Achievement Award on three occasions, the Carr P. Collins Outstanding Professor Award presented annually by the graduating class, the Outstanding Professor Award given by Gamma Beta Phi Honor Society, and the Outstanding Faculty Member Award presented by the student congress.

O'Brien is a noted author who has published more than 70 scholarly articles and entries for the Anchor Bible Dictionary, as well as for Eerdmans, Mercer and Holman encyclopedias. His four books are: "Set Free by Forgiveness: The Way to Peace and Healing," "I Feel Better All Over Than I Do Anywhere Else," "Who Is Jesus?" and "The Progression of the Mosaic Motif to the Johannine Concept of Messiah."

O'Brien has also served as pastor or interim pastor of 19 churches in Texas, Arkansas, and Louisiana. He regularly preaches in revivals and conferences in churches, conventions, and universities across the United States and abroad.

Listed in Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Religion, Who's Who in Humanities in Higher Education, C-N's president is a member of the American Academy of Religion and the Society of Biblical Literature. He recently completed a term as president of the National Association of Baptist Professors of Religion, Southwest Region; and presently sits on the executive board of the International Association of Baptist Colleges and Universities.

He is a decorated military veteran who served with the 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam. In that role he received, among other decorations, the Combat Infantryman's Badge, the United States Air Medal, The Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross, and the Bronze Star.

O'Brien is married to Kay, a licensed social worker who taught in Baylor's School of Social Work from 1997 until moving to Jefferson City. The couple has two daughters, Allison Elise who is married to Nathan Syer, and Shannon who is married to Eric Evans. Both couples are currently preparing to serve as international missionaries. They also have a son, Chris, a college freshman.

DAVID BARGER ATHLETIC DIRECTOR 29TH Year Carson-Newman, 1970

A 1970 graduate of Carson-Newman College and a member of the athletic department since 1980, David Barger is in his 19th year as athletic director and is the dean of the South Atlantic Conference (SAC) athletic directors. Since coming on board 29 years ago, Barger has been involved in all facets of the program. He has used that knowledge and expertise to build one of the premier athletic programs at the NCAA Division II level.

As athletic director, he oversaw Carson-Newman's move from the NAIA ranks to NCAA Division II (1993-94). Barger has served on NCAA

committees and directed numerous NCAA postseason events on the C-N campus in the sports of football, soccer, wrestling and basketball. He played an instrumental role in the renovation of Holt Fieldhouse and the construction of the Maddox Student Activities Center during the 1992-93 sports year. Barger has had significant input in the planning and promotion of the new Burke-Tarr Stadium.

The Athletic Department has also undergone changes in regards to gender equity as the women's programs have been upgraded under Barger's leadership. There has been a twenty percent increase in the number of student-athletes participating in intercollegiate athletics since Barger became A.D. Prior to

taking the A.D. post on an interim basis in Feb., 1990, and receiving a permanent appointment in May 1990, Barger had served the Carson-Newman athletic program in many ways. His service to the college dates back to his days spent here in pursuit of a degree.

Following his high school days at Chattanooga Red Bank where he was recently inducted into the school's Hall of Fame, Barger worked as a student athletic trainer while earning a degree in business administration. That area of study was put to good use over the next ten years as he worked as an auditor and controller in the banking industry in Chattanooga and Morristown.

In the years following his graduation, Barger continued to serve the athletic department and Carson-Newman in numerous capacities. He served as vice president and president of the National Alumni Association and president of the Eagle Club. He also served as a member of the Alumni Executive Committee, member of the Board of Advisors and president of the Chattanooga alumni chapter. In 1978, the C-N letterman was presented the Eagle Club's Booster of the Year award.

Barger joined the athletic department on a full-time, professional basis in 1980, when he became the director of athletic promotions. After serving in that role for nine years, he was named the director of athletic development in 1989. Just a few months later, Barger was named interim athletic director and later full-time A.D., replacing Ken Sparks.

David resides in Talbott with his wife, Malinda. The Bargers are active members of Manley Baptist Church where David serves as a deacon. They have three children Allyson (Kilgore), Paul and Philip and two grandsons, Taylor and Tanner Kilgore.

MIKE VAN BRUGGEN HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER 9th Year

Mike Van Bruggen begins his ninth year as head athletic trainer for the Eagles.

Van Bruggen oversees all aspects of providing comprehensive health care for the more than 500 Eagle student-athletes. Additionally, Mike is responsible for the implementation of the athletic department's comprehensive Alcohol & Drug Education and Testing Program. As a faculty member in C-N's Department of Health, Physical Education and Sport Science, Van Bruggen has been instrumental in the development of the athletic training education major which was awarded national accreditation in the fall of 2004.

Van Bruggen is an active volunteer on local, regional and national levels, serving as a CPR instructor for the American Red Cross. He currently serves as the Tennessee representative on the Southeast Athletic Trainers Association college and university athletic trainers committee. Prior to arriving in Jefferson City, Mike was the Head Athletic Trainer and Assistant Athletic Director at Howard Payne University in Texas.
