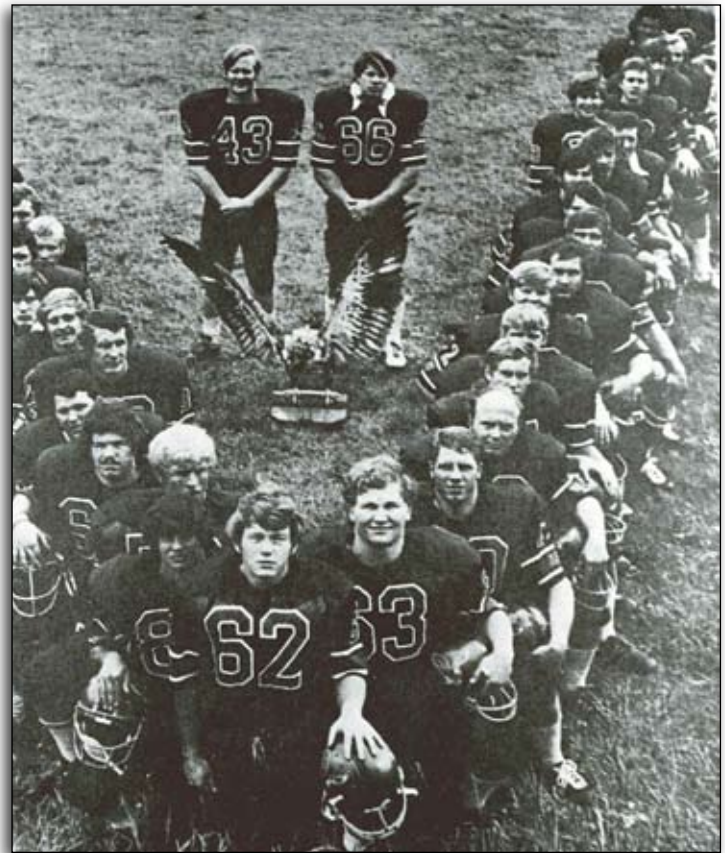

East Texas State 21, Carson-Newman 18

COMMERCE, TEXAS - Carson-Newman suffered a 21-18 setback in its first football national championship appearance. East Texas State defeated the number-two ranked Eagles in the NAIA Champion Bowl.

NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP
December 17, 1983
Carson-Newman 36, Mesa College 28

GRAND JUNCTION, COLO. - The Eagles defeated Mesa College 36-28 to capture their first NAIA football national championship. C-N exploded for 27 points in the second quarter and led 27-13 at halftime.

Carson-Newman added a field goal in the third period and another touchdown in the final stanza to hold off a 15-point second half comeback by Mesa.

The Eagles were ranked 12th at the end of the regular season but came from no where to win the national title. The Eagles were the lowest ranked team at the end of the regular season to ever win the national title.



NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP
December 15, 1984
Carson-Newman 19, Central Arkansas 19

CONWAY, ARK. - For the second straight season, the Eagles had to battle for the NAIA national championship on unfamiliar territory. C-N and UCA battled evenly for four quarters in what resulted in a Co-National Championship.

The Eagles battled from behind all day. After trailing 13-0, C-N took a 14-13 lead on touchdowns from Jeff Joslin and Kenneth Tyson. The Bears made it 19-14 before a Louis Reveiz field goal brought the Eagles within two at 19-17. Allen Stevens then caught Jeff Fusilier in the endzone with 6:46 to go to tie the game at the eventual final score, 19-19. Kenneth Tyson and Allen Stevens were named offensive and defensive players of the game.



NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP
December 20, 1986
Carson-Newman 17, Cameron 0

JEFFERSON CITY, TENN. - It was the first college national championship event ever played in the state of Tennessee. As a result, the Eagles shutout Cameron 17-0 to capture their third national championship in four years.

Top offensive performer Pat Johnson also made it a first as he returned a Cameron punt 80 yards to set a Champion Bowl record and opened the scoring in a defensive struggle.

Freshman quarterback Edwin Lowery dashed 54 yards to set up a one yard plunge by Kenneth Tyson. A 45-yard field goal by Louis Reveiz in the third quarter completed the scoring for the Eagles.





NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

December 19, 1987
Cameron 30, Carson-Newman 2

LAWTON, Okla. - The Eagles could not overcome a 30-point deficit in losing the NAIA Champion Bowl to Cameron 30-2.

Cameron held C-N to 172 yards of offense, recorded a safety in the fourth quarter to avoid the shutout. It was the Eagles 5th appearance in the national championship contest since 1972.

NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

December 17, 1988
Carson-Newman 56, Adams State 21

JEFFERSON CITY, Tenn. - Vernon Turner scooted 80 yards for a touchdown on the first play from scrimmage as the Eagles knocked off Adams State 56-21 to capture their fourth NAIA national championship.

The Indians pulled to within a touchdown at 21-14, but could move no closer as Robert Thomas scored a pair of touchdowns for C-N to secure the win. Turner and defensive tackle Beauford Perkins were named the players of the game.



NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

December 10, 1989
Carson-Newman 34, Emporia State 20

JEFFERSON CITY, Tenn. - Carson-Newman closed out a decade of championships by defeating Emporia State 34-20 for its 5th NAIA title in seven years.

The Hornets scored first on a pass from Mike Burch to Arnie Burcham then Robert Hardy, who would later be named the game's offensive MVP, scored from 77 yards out on the Eagles' first play from scrimmage to make it 7-7. ESU again took the lead, but the Eagles again answered with 13 points in the second quarter en route to the victory. Gary Laging, was named the defensive MVP with six tackles and two sacks.

FLORENCE, Ala. - Playing in the eighth national championship game in school history, Carson-Newman's charmed run through the playoffs came to an abrupt end with a 23-16 loss to the University of Northern Colorado in front of a national television audience on ESPN2.

Entering the contest with a plus 10 turnover ratio in the playoffs, the Eagles could not maintain that trend, as they fumbled three times and were picked off on three more occasions. All five C-N possessions in the second half ended in turnovers.

The Eagles got touchdown runs of one and 57 yards from their leading rusher Tyrone Westmoreland, who finished the day with 99 yards on 13 carries.

1998 NCAA DIVISION II NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

December 12, 1998

Northwest Missouri State 24, Carson-Newman 6

FLORENCE, ALA. - The Eagles' quest for a sixth national championship came up a little short as Northwest Missouri State downed Carson-Newman 24-6.

Florence was besieged by over a foot of rain in the week leading up to the game and both teams had to fight the mud and the muck. Carson-Newman scored the first points of the game when Leonard Guyton connected with Jarvonni Jackson for a 36-yard touchdown pass.

But the Bearcats scored 17 points in the second quarter and added another score in the third frame to win their first national title. Melvin Oates rushed for 56 yards and Heath Hawkins added 35 yards. Ques Rumph racked up 48 receiving yards and quarterback Leonard Guyton amassed 106 yards. Matthew Burris led the Eagles with 10 tackles.



1999 NCAA DIVISION II NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

December 11, 1999

Northwest Missouri 58, Carson-Newman 52 (4 OT)

FLORENCE, Ala. - In what some have called the college football "Game of the Century", the Eagles and Bearcats of Northwest Missouri State battled through four quarters and four overtimes before NWMS won 58-52.

Over 2,500 Carson-Newman fans made the trip to Alabama to see a terrific game. After the Bearcats took an early 7-0 lead, the Eagles reeled off 24 unanswered points starting with Ryan Fleming's 38-yard field goal. Ques Rumph put C-N up 10-7 when he electrified the crowd with an 86-yard punt return for a touchdown. Melvin Oates ran in from one yard out and Myron Refoure scored on a 20-yard scamper to give the Eagles a 24-7 lead at the half.

The two teams battled back and forth through the third and fourth quarters until C-N took a 44-29 lead on Antwon Oliver's 12-yard run with three and a half minutes remaining in the game. The Bearcats kept clawing and sent the game into overtime with a 34-yard touchdown pass with 10 seconds to go.

The Eagles and Bearcats' defenses were impressive in the extra frame as neither team could score. C-N struck first in the third overtime as Oliver scored on a one-yard touchdown. Leonard Guyton's keeper on the two-point conversion was good and the Eagles led 52-44. After NWMS had tied the game at 52-52, the Bearcats took a 58-52 lead in the fourth overtime. The Eagles were driving for another score but the ball squirted out and Northwest jumped on it to win the game, 58-52.

The Eagle offense was almost unstoppable as they compiled 419 yards on the ground, led by Oliver's 194 yards and two touchdowns. Carson-Newman's defense held the Bearcats to only 137 yards on the ground.

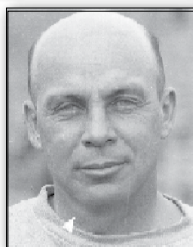

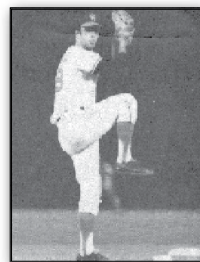

on both sides of the football for the '53-'55 Eagles. He was well regarded for classroom achievement and participated in campus government activities.

After graduation, Mr. Bacon served in the US Navy Reserve and later joined the G.E. Company. He retired from G.E. in 1997 after 38 years that spanned a variety of assignments, primarily in information systems and asset management.

Mr. Bacon is a strong proponent of programs that support student-athletes. This endowment honors his parents, Ben. H. and Mamie E., lifetime Cleveland residents and longtime members of the Big Springs Baptist Church in Cleveland.

THE WILLIAM "TANK" BLACK ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP

(Established in 1997 by former Eagle wide receiver "Tank" Black.)

Tank became one of the greatest receivers in the history of Eagle football. He still holds the record for single season and career receptions.

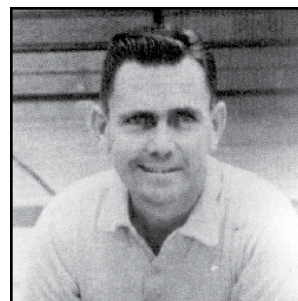
**THE KENNETH E. PARMAN AND JOYCE J. PARMAN
